Greener Printing

While many people make efforts to avoid printing, often it is necessary. Printing uses paper and energy and is done in offices, warehouses, retail locations, schools and even at home. When we print, we can still reduce the paper and energy used by taking a minute to "green" our project before hitting the print button.

If you control the document, you can control the impact of printing it. * Narrow margins: half inch all the way around works well for most. * Use a font that takes up less space (experiment to find one you like, this font is Times New Roman) * Use Bold fonts and settings sparingly. * Avoid large type.

Bicycling Options Growing in Illinois!

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is in the midst of developing Illinois' first long-range bicycle plan. They are seeking input from everyone, offering workshops for and transportation planning professionals along with average citizens. The goal is to improve bicycling options in Illinois. IDOT has recognized the importance of offering



bicycle options for years with the 80/20 match program offered to municipalities and counties when state roads are improved. The local jurisdiction is asked to contribute only 20% of the cost of right of way and construction of a bike path that runs parallel to the state road. This program has created bike paths that are used for commuting as well as recreation. Safe routes to schools so children can walk or bike to schools are also a state priority. This reduces busing needs, related pollution and cost, as well as promoting healthy living habits to the next generation.

Will County encourages our residents, local governments and businesses to get involved in the IDOT outreach. Let them know what you need to make biking a safe alternative to driving for errands, recreation and commuting. * Consider software known as Eco-Font to put tiny holes in any font you choose so less ink is used when printed. * Avoid using a large logo that takes up much of the page, causing memos to require two pages. * Avoid fax cover sheets, use adhesive notes if the sheet isn't already addressed (scan & email to avoid faxing). * Question the value of centering, studies show people read left margin writing better. * Always DOUBLE-SIDE. * Adjust pre-set bullet and indent settings to take up less space. * Keep header and footer space small *Print on recycled content paper - 20% post-consumer looks and works as well as nonrecycled.

Regardless of these saving efforts, don't make your fonts too small to read as this defeats the purpose altogether!

Making the End, Green!

Death is a natural part of life but often the customs practiced to honor those that have passed away, have a very negative impact on nature. The embalming process is the most harsh



component of what has become in the past century, a normal procedure. Approximately two million Americans are embalmed with a mixture of formaldehyde, ethanol, methanol and other hazardous solvents each year. These toxins can leak into the soil of cemeteries causing environmental harm.

Increasingly, people are asking for greener options for themselves or loved ones. Cremation is often the first choice as it is readily available and less expensive. However it has some negative environmental impacts as well. Air pollution is the main concern, which can include mercury emissions due primarily to dental fillings. When all aspects of both methods are considered, cremation is a "greener" option than embalming.

Other options include a donation to research, which may still result in embalming but the body serves to educate or advance scientific study. Since the 1990s, the practice of natural burial, as was done for thousands of years, has had a resurgence. A burial site is often a designated part of a land conservancy. Bodies, free of chemicals and covered simply in cloth, are buried following safety and environmental standards. Decomposition is allowed to occur naturally, recycling and returning nutrients to the earth.
