



Will Incandescents **Disappear** January 1, 2012?

The Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 requires new light bulbs to meet higher efficiency standards beginning in January of 2012. It does NOT ban incandescent light bulbs but the standards will result in the phasing out of traditional inefficient incandescent bulbs. Compact fluorescent and LED bulbs offer more efficient alternatives and the CFL bulbs are comparable in price based on their longer life expectency. Some people worry about the small amount of mercury in CFLs (LEDs do not contain mercury), but the risk they pose is very small, particularly if

the light bulbs are disposed of properly or cleaned up properly in the rare even one breaks. It should be noted that traditional bulbs require far more energy and when that energy is from coal power, far more mercury getting into the environment. If you insist on using incandescent lights, the major light bulb manufacturers are offering halogen incandescent bulbs that meet the new efficiency standards. Several specialty bulbs are exempt from the law and stores are permitted to sell the traditional incandescents until they run out.


Featured ReUse Option: ReStore
