## Unv of St. Francis Weaves Plastic

For several years, the University of St. Francis collected plastic bags as part of a world-wide project to recycle the bags into plarn (plastic yarn), then crochet or weave them into mats for the homeless. This year, the Sustainability Committee decided to move the project forward with the help of the University Chaplain, who is also a master weaver. USF students, faculty, and staff have been engaged in the surprisingly relaxing and productive process of “plarning,” recycling thousands of bags in the process.



## Health Dept Cleans for the Earth

The Will County Health Department took on the chore of cleaning up litter from their building sites in Joliet on April 22. They gathered over a dozen bags of material, mostly disposable cups and plastic items that couldn't be recycled. They make every effort to recycle inside, with numerous recycling stations throughout the offices and public areas. 

## State Reduces Plastic Purchases

The state legislature passed Senate Bill 1915 to restrict the procurement of single use plastics by state agencies. The department of natural resources lead the effort due to concerns for wildlife impacted by litter. While the State Fair is exempt, and there are allowances to meet the needs of disabled clients, most state offices will no longer purchase straws and polystyrene items.



## Reducing Confusion - Make Aluminum Balls

Everyone knows aluminum cans are recyclable but questions abound on foil and bakeware. How clean is clean? Are candy wrappers (such as Hershey Kiss foil) recyclable?
