World Environmental Day: June 5

World Environment Day is celebrated annually on the 5th of June and encourages awareness and action for the protection of the environment. It is supported by many non-governmental organizations, businesses, government entities, and represents the primary United Nations outreach day supporting the environment. If the weather allows, perhaps you might celebrate by biking or installing water conservation devices on shower and sink faucets.



Tip for Drivers - Biking Safety

Since January 1st of 2019 all motorists in Illinois are to use the "Dutch Reach" when opening their door to prevent bicycle injuries. Every year, thousands of bicyclists are injured when drivers open their doors as bikers pass. The "Dutch Reach" refers to using your right hand to reach across your body to open the driver door, forcing you to turn and look at oncoming traffic, along with possible bicyclists. Its slight inconvenience is a great safety trick, preventing accidents whenever utilizing on-street parking.



Solar Jobs Continue to Grow

The Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) sets a goal for Illinois to reach **50% renewable energy by 2040** and invests \$380 million a year in the development of new renewable energy. These investments, along with other federal investments, will require a significant expansion of the solar workforce in Illinois. Community Gardens Thriving

When your home is not suited for a garden due to the limited space or ascetic concerns, consider container gardening or joining your local community garden. In Romeoville, a 10 ft x 10 ft plot is rented for \$40 a season and applications are accepted by the Park District each Spring. (This season is filled) Different items may be planted at different times of the year and many items are being put in now so try your luck at growing some fresh tomatoes, green peppers, or lettuce. While google may be at your finger tips, knowledgeable, local help is also offered by the University of Illinois Extension Office, located in Joliet; just a phone call or email away!



Solar Switch 2023

The Grow Solar (Solarize) program is returning this year as Solar Switch! In partnership with the Midwest Renewable Energy Association, Citizens Utility Board, and local partners and neighbors, Will County is hosting free informational sessions on the environmental and financial implications of residential solar energy. Solar Switch also vets qualified installers and leverages group buying power to lower the price on solar installations. \$32 Million in C-PACE Efficiency

To date, commercial property owners in Will County have secured more than \$32 million for energy efficiency and renewable energy projects through the C-PACE program since its creation in late 2020. These projects are projected to save over 1,000,000 kWh of electricity, 2,600,000 gallons of water, \$102,000 in utility costs, and 2,000 tons of carbon dioxide equivalent in emissions every year. If you are a commercial property owner considering an efficiency project, C-PACE may help you overcome the initial cost barriers through long-term, fixed-interest financing. New Shelter for Commuters

Pace was thrilled to welcome Congressman Bill Foster, Will County Executive Jennifer Bertino-Tarrant, along with Mayor Mary Alexander-Basta to celebrate the funding of a passenger waiting area at the agency's Old Chicago (Bolingbrook) Park-n-Ride. The new building will shield waiting riders from inclement weather and will be fully ADA compliant. The waiting area will include modern amenities, such as restrooms and a vending machine for reloading Ventra Cards. This facility has already seen recent upgrades, including an increase in the number of parking spots and the installation of an electronic bus tracker sign.

Paint Bill sent to Governor

Senate Bill 683, sponsored by local Senator Linda Holmes and local Representative Natalie Manley, passed the Senate and House unanimously and is now on its way to the Governor. When signed, it will set in motion the planning of a retail paint collection program serving all of Illinois. The paint manufacturers fund a non-profit group to find interested retailers willing to accept latex and oil-based paint from residents and contractors. The non-profit then bids a contract for the collection service, and the recycling of the paint and containers. Oil-based paint may be used to displace fossil fuel but most latex will be turned into paint again and sold at stores such as the Joliet Restore! Same quality standard but half the price!



Reducing Polystyrene (Styrofoam)

The Illinois Environmental Council has been working diligently to reduce single-use polystyrene, most recently proposing a statewide ban on items such as foam cups and clamshell containers. They have



successfully passed a more limited, first-step effort that is on its way to the Governor. The bill calls on all state agencies and state funded colleges to cease purchasing the foam products. The environmental community claimed the manufacture of these products requires use of toxic, forever chemicals and that recycling of foam has never proven truly viable for the population.

Plants such as agave, sorghum, and sugarcane are pressed for their juices. After pressing, bagasse is made from the remaining plant material, which is mixed with water to form a pulp and pressed or molded into food service products.

Learning about Geo-Thermal

Will County co-hosted its first Grow Geo education session on geothermal heat pumps in collaboration with CUB, MREA, the Geothermal Alliance of Illinois, The Conservation Foundation, Joliet Junior College, and the Sierra Club. 30 participants heard from residents who have used geothermal energy for years, hearing how ground-source heat pumps work and what it looks like to use it at home. They were also told about an option to join a "group buy opportunity" to pursue this renewable resource at a reduced price and a fully vetted vendor. Geothermal keeps buildings comfortable and highly efficient by exchanging heat with the earth, moving thermal energy rather than creating it. Eco-Friendly does Not mean Recyclable

At recent Environmental Fairs, participants have been asking us about recycling eco-friendly products. Eco-friendly is an adjective with broad meaning and not specific to any item's recyclability. If an item is made from a renewable resource, such as plants or trees, it may or may not be recyclable or compostable. If an item is made from recycled materials, it may or may



not be recyclable. A paper cup, for example, is made with a coating to prevent it from falling apart when filled with liquid. That coating may be safe to compost or it may not but, as of today, it is not accepted in any curbside or drop-off paper recycling programs in Illinois. If in doubt, check us out at www.WillCountyGreen.com. We may ask for a photo and description.

Collection Events a Success

Despite cold weather, wind, and rain, the April collection events were a success. The May events were offered in warmer and more clear days with ample participation. Recyclepalooza had over 800 households participate in bringing hazardous chemicals, electronics, and donations primarily. A larger truck was used for Polystyrene (better known as Styrofoam). Scrap metal and wood were also very popular drop-off items.

Collections of Electronics in Shorewood, and two large events in Homer Glen and Wilmington, where Electronics and HHW was taken, were also well attended. These special Saturday events are not offered over the summer but will return in the Fall. Efforts are made to offer collection throughout all corners of the County over the course of a few years.

The annual Textile Collection brought in over 2,000 more pounds of material than last year! Thank you to everyone that participated in any of these events. Your efforts make an impact!


