

Electric Fuel is Cheaper than Gas

Switching from gasoline to electric is not just about the cost of the vehicle, but the cost of maintenance (EVs cost less to maintain) and the cost of fuel. The Washington Post ran an article using research from the nonpartisan Energy Innovation think tank proving that **in every state within the US, it is less expensive to use electricity to fuel your ride than gasoline**. Oil prices are known for volatility and electric prices are considered stable, but they do vary. In the Chicagoland region both electric and gasoline fuel prices escalate in the summer. If you are on ComEd's Real Time pricing, you may be aware of the higher price on a typical afternoon. An EV owner with real time pricing can program their vehicle to refuel during the night when rates are lowest. Will County, and many cities in the area, have fixed low rates through large purchase agreements with ComEd. This is how the County and some cities along with several businesses that are large energy users find it easier to offer FREE charging to residents and/or employees, finding it cheaper to fund than a space heater.



Leaves: Leave them or Mow them

As the leaves fall, we encourage you to think about them differently. Instead of raking and bagging them, consider the benefits they offer your lawn and the many insects or animals that share it. Leaves form a natural mulch that helps suppress weeds and fertilizes the soil as they break down; basically becoming free mulch and fertilizer. Removing leaves also eliminates vital wildlife habitat. Critters ranging from turtles and toads to birds, mammals and invertebrates rely on leaf litter for food, shelter and nesting material. Many moth and butterfly caterpillars overwinter in fallen leaves before emerging in spring.

If you still feel the need to tidy your lawn, consider adopting these options:



Feed the beneficial insects
living in your yard by
letting the leaves lie

- Chop the leaves with a mulching mower but leave them on the lawn and they will decompose naturally
- Rake leaves off the lawn to use as mulch in garden beds
- Make compost: Combine fallen leaves (“brown material”) with grass clippings and other “green material” and keep moist and well mixed. You’ll have nutrient-rich compost to add to your garden next spring.

Simple Solution: Plant Trees

While not the only solution, but one step in a series of steps to address Climate Change, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is planting trees. As communities across the United States work to mitigate the impacts of extreme heat, trees and green spaces have emerged as an economical and effective solution. To help cities and counties bolster their green spaces, the USDA announced \$1 billion in funding in September to be used for 385 projects nationwide. The awarded organizations and communities were selected from 842 applications, which the USDA states demonstrates a substantial need for more trees and green spaces. 

Smart Surfaces: Roads & Roofs

Cool roofs, green roofs, porous pavements and more can seriously reduce the heat which has been increasing each year for over a decade. Will County has several buildings with cool roofs. These roofs are light-colored and engineered to reflect the light and heat out of the atmosphere reducing the heating of city air. Traditional dark-colored roofs absorb more of the light that falls on them, radiating heat into the building and the surrounding air—increasing cooling cost and energy consumption while decreasing comfort.

Benefits of cool roofs:

- Less heat emitted into city air
- Saves on energy cost
- Increases outdoor comfort
- Reduces pollution (slows formation of ground-level ozone)
- Less heat transferred into building
- Saves on energy cost
- Reduces pollution (from reduced demand on non-renewable power plants)
- Increases indoor comfort



On a 99 degree Fahrenheit day, a dark roof may reach 177 degrees while the cool roof hits 111. More impressive, 80% of the heat is reflected away while a dark roof makes a hot day worse, with only 5% of the heat reflected away.


Moment of Vegan Inspiration

According to a report in the New York Times, a NYC hospital made plant-based meals the default for patients and this has reduced food-related greenhouse gas emissions by 36% while possibly improving patient health. Plant based food options have been expanding and improving. Once dominated by beef and chicken analogues (a chemical compound that is structurally similar to another), the plant-based industry is seemingly moving towards less conventional products, and experimenting with advanced technology. The goal is to offer a varied menu for global diners—including flexitarians and curious omnivores—that supports a shift towards a more [sustainable food system](#).



Feed and Protect your Trees


Now is an excellent time of year to mulch your trees, shrubs and, especially evergreens. You may use excess leaves and brush chips. This will allow root systems to access moisture in the cold dry winds of winter. Pine trees and other evergreens often brown and die in the winter due to the dry conditions. Remember never to build mulch up against the trunk of plants as it can cause damage and death. Root systems tend to expand out as far as the leaf canopy, so lower and wider mulch disbursement is best for the plant.



Never build a volcano of mulch!
Use leaves and brush chips in a wide circle for winter nourishment.

Recycling Funds for Illinois EPA

Will County signed a letter of support for the Illinois EPA's application for federal grant funds to improve education and perform a statewide waste characterization study. In mid September, the Illinois EPA received \$733,568 from the U.S. EPA as part of the Recycling Infrastructure grant funding. While we await action, we are excited to see these funds being used for planning, data collection and implementation of plans. Will County is in the process of updating our Solid Waste Plan and recognizes the serious need for a waste characterization study since Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) became a much larger part of the waste stream and home delivery of products has increased packaging material generation. This year alone, over 450 Will County residents signed up to learn more about residential solar systems via Solar Power Hours; by the close of this summer's registration period in mid-September, more than 50 Will County residents accepted personal offers for home solar installations at a reduced rate. 
