Denny's Achieves LEED & Proves Going Green Saves Money!

Will County Executive Larry Walsh joined Joliet Mayor Tom Giarrante and others to recognize Denny's for earning LEED certification in June. This makes the restaurant one of a few dozen eateries worldwide to be so recognized!

According to the US Green Building Council the restaurant at 2531 Plainfield Road is the first restaurant in Will County to earn the certification. A Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design certification recognizes best-inclass building strategies and



practices. Only 38 restaurants in the world are LEED-certified.

Owners Joe and Susan Terrell said LEED guidelines were used in every phase of construction, including the use of recycled materials and responsible recycling of all waste materials generated during the project. Energy efficient appliances as well as many water and energy conservation innovations were included in the building.

Joe Terrell estimates he is saving \$20,000 per year in utility charges. "These changes have been both economically and environmentally advantageous for our restaurant," he said. "We are proud to be doing our part for the environment."

confidential material. The risk would be someone seeing the material in your garbage or recycling container. Care should be taken when discarding confidential documents. Tear, cut or shred items before recycling them.

If you are very concerned, consider placing torn items in two different paper bags and placing the bags at the curb over the course of two weeks.

Always recycle shredded paper in paper bags to keep it from blowing loose. While your identity is still protected, the paper becomes a litter nuisance.

If you have a large amount and don't wish to purchase an electric shredder, you may take your documents to a "Shredding Event." These are offered occasionally by banks, tax service firms and local governments. Please know these events are an expense to the host. All paper from shredding events is recycled.

Other items commonly purchased by State Agencies and others include: Retread tires, 10-30% recycled content paper, recycled content plastic can liners, recycled envelopes, recycled content toilet paper, paper towels, refilled printer cartridges, re-refined motor oil, compostable/biodegradable vegetable-based food service plates, recycled latex paint and much more.

If each business started requesting these recycled content and environmentally preferable items, we would increase demand and strength markets for the items we place in our recycling bins. Ask your school, church, office or the stores you shop in, if they offer or use these products.

Prevent Mosquito Bites and Breeding!

Mosquitoes are not just annoying, they may also carry disease such as West Nile Virus. Their peak breeding season is during the summer months when they take advantage of standing water.



There are things you can do around the house to prevent the spread of mosquitoes and decrease bites. Eliminate standing water - don't allow water to stand in a pet bowl or on a pool cover in your yard. Make it a habit to regularly clean and empty excess water from pools, pool covers, hot tubs, gutters, bird baths, and flower pots. Drill holes in the bottom of tire swings or garbage bins to limit standing water. Ensure that screens, windows, and doors have a tight fit and are free of holes; this can prevent mosquitoes from flying into your home and can further limit your exposure to mosquitoes.

Consider limiting your time outdoors when mosquitoes are the most active, at dawn and dusk. When you are outside, wear loose fitting, light colored clothing featuring long sleeves, long pants, and socks.

If you want to use a natural repellant, look for items that contain essential oils as "active ingredients" such as:

- neem oil
- geranium oil
- tea tree/melaleuca oil
- lavender oil
- rosemary oil
- catnip/catnip oil
- peppermint oil
