Illinois Recycling Association Recognizes 2009 Award Winners:

Plainfield student collects athletic shoes to recycle and save landfill space by gwurster, July 23, 2009 Plainfield Enterprise

One Thousand Years. That's how long it takes a shoe to break down into the earth. That's how long a shoe takes up space in our landfills. Plainfield eighth grader, Sarah Wurster, thinks that is way too long and is doing something about it. Throughout the month of August she is asking local residents to recycle their worn-out athletic shoes at several local businesses which agreed to be drop off points.

The shoe drive makes great use of the three R's; "Reduce" landfill use, "Reuse" shoes by donating those in good condition, and "Recycle" the rubber soles through the Nike Reuse-A-Shoe program. "Collected shoes will be delivered to a local Nike collection point, shipped to their Oregon plant, and be ground up into basketball and tennis courts, running tracks, and playgrounds," explains the Timber Ridge Middle School student.

Area residents can drop off their unwanted athletic shoes at the following locations:

- Jeric's Skate Shop Plainfield
- Play It Again Sports Shorewood
- Newsome Physical Therapy Crest Hill
- Bank of Shorewood Plainfield

Recycling shoes took root last summer when the family was going to drop off their shoes to Nike and Sarah thought there must be a lot of people just like them with shoes that could be recycled too. Last Fall netted 550 shoes saved from the landfill and another 679 shoes were dropped off throughout the school year. In addition, 3 Plainfield schools did their own shoe collections in response to her plea to help our environment.

Sarah hopes that this year more will help our planet by doing this simple deed. "My goal is that everyone will save their worn out shoes for recycling because even one shoe saves another 1,000 years of decomposing from landfills." She is looking for a group or organization to adopt the project she has started so the program can grow and reach all of the Plainfield/ Joliet area. Every pair makes a difference. The Lockport Township High School Interact Club has earned statewide accolades for its recycling efforts. The Illinois Recycling Association recently presented club members with the High School Environmental Club Award and \$500 at its annual conference awards dinner in Bloomington. LTHS was the only high school to receive a recycling award.

Interact was lauded for its strong support and commitment to recycling efforts in Illinois, according to Dave Miller, awards committee chair for Illinois Recycling. The club, a student-run organization that works in association with the Lockport Rotary, conducts community service projects that include recycling and environmental efforts.

Some of those projects include expanding a district-wide recycling program with Waste Management Co. to include glass, aluminum, plastic and cardboard in addition to paper. Interact worked out the logistics for recycling more materials and then promoted the new program with

school announcements, making posters made out of recyclables for both school campuses, writing and directing a commercial for school news show and designing T-shirts that read, "Don't Be Trashy, Recycle", according to Interact Club faculty sponsor Andrea Quintanar, who said the club collected five tons of recyclables this year.

Interact Club also set up cans in school offices to collect used batteries and encouraged students and staff to use both sides of paper by creating a "Don't be One-Sided" campaign. In addition, club members participated in a used shoe collection with the Will County Land Use Department and Share Your Soles and collected used buttons to donate to the Joliet Hospice to make teddy bears for families who recently lost a loved one.

Interact Club also promotes recycling at the annual Lockport Earth Day Fair by teaching children how to sort garbage in their homes and during Earth Hour by encouraging local businesses to turn off their lights for one hour. "We believe that through integrating these activities in everything we do, we will make the biggest impact," Quintanar said. The Interact Club plans to use the \$500 award to possibly convert one of the district's school buses to a biodiesel bus to allow the group to recycle the vegetable oil used in the district's cafeteria.

"As the Interact Club carries out different types of service projects which require transportation, we would like to make our carbon footprint as light as possible as we set out to do good works. We would also like to get other clubs such as the auto club and art club involved to decorate the bus to advertise the fact that we are able to use alternative fuels in traditional transportation," Ouintanar said.

WASTE TO ENERGY PLANT

May 21, 2009 - Officials of Will County and Waste Management of Illinois, Inc. today announced a plan to jointly develop a landfill gas-to-energy plant at the Prairie View Recycling and Disposal Facility near Wilmington.

Under plans announced today, Will County and Waste Management will enter into an agreement to develop a landfill gas-to-energy plant at the facility, which will generate electricity that is distributed over the area's electrical grid. Waste Management will build and operate the facility, which could be in operation by the end of 2010.

Will County intends to apply for federal economic stimulus funds earmarked for renewable energy projects to help finance the project. Once the grant process is complete, Will County anticipates putting at least \$1 million in stimulus funds toward the project. Prairie View Landfill is owned by Will County and is its primary waste disposal facility. Waste Management operates the site under a long-term agreement. It opened in January 2004.

The landfill gas-to-energy plant is another example of Will County's efforts to promote a greener environment by creating an alternative energy source locally.
